Course Description

An interdisciplinary seminar devoted to reading and writing creative nonfiction, an emerging genre encompassing memoir, personal essay, literary journalism, narrative history, cultural criticism, nature writing, travelogue, and other belletristic forms. This seminar is part literature course, part writing workshop: students read and discuss a variety of exemplary texts and also write and critique their own ventures into creative nonfiction. Class discussions are supplemented by guest speakers, audiovisual presentations, and campus events. Students have the opportunity to explore a wide range of approaches to and interpretations of creative nonfiction; to experience the challenges and satisfactions of working in this emerging literary genre; and to develop their own critical skills for use in academic, professional, and personal settings.
