#### **Course Description**

This course is an interdisciplinary seminar in native religious studies. Common readings survey the cultural contexts for native religious history and explore native religious diversity in the contemporary period, especially the relationship between tribal and Christian traditions in reservation and urban communities. Individual research projects focus on historical and/or comparative topics in native religious studies. Class discussions are supplemented by guest speakers, audiovisual presentations, and campus events. Students have the opportunity to develop a basic understanding of native religious traditions; to become familiar with the methodology of religious studies; to reflect on the broader theoretical and practical questions raised by the intersections of religion, culture, and politics in a diverse and conflicted world; and to develop their own critical skills for use in academic, professional, and personal settings.
